School Curriculum:

Parklands Christian College is committed to academic excellence and to providing a curriculum, which is broad enough to cater for a wide range of student abilities and interests. In addition to all regular school subjects, Parklands seeks to provide a range of distinctive curriculum offerings.

Primary School

In the Primary School, curriculum offerings include:

- A strong focus on literacy and numeracy
- Creating engaging and flexible learning experiences that meet the needs of our learners
- Use of technology, as well as the commencement of a oneto-one device learning journey from Year 5.
- Weekly specialist lessons in Auslan, The Arts, HPE, Technologies and Library.
- Spiritual and cultural development of our students through daily devotions, weekly Chapels and assemblies, as well as various events.
- Give it a go band is provided as an instrumental program where students can learn to play an instrument and develop their ability to read music and work together as part of a band. Other specialty instrumental teachers are also available to provide lessons throughout the week.



Middle School

In Middle School, there is a strong focus on exploration, as students begin to experience specialisation in their educational journey. Alongside core learning

experiences in literacy and numeracy, students are given choice in their subjects for the first time in their schooling career, after many years of tasting and experimenting.

- A strong focus on English and Mathematics
- Technology-assisted, high level differentiation for individualised learning pathways in English and Mathematics
- Ability streaming for English and Mathematics across Year 8 (Semester 2 only) and 9 (Semester 1 and 2)
- Homework and take-home assessment allocated in core subjects only for Year 7, with an increasing load as students move towards senior college
- Core subjects across all of Middle School: Mathematics, Science, Geography/History, English and HPE



- Elective subjects in Year 9: Visual Art, Drama, Music, STEM, Business, Digital Technology, Construction and Design.
- Parklands specific subjects: Christian Life Skills, Pastoral Care and Home Class
- Exposure to a wide range of subjects, repeating over 3 years (Year 7-9)
- Online content and activities for all subjects



Senior College

- In Year 10, units have been developed across subjects for Semester 2 implementation, that target prerequisite skills needed for successful transition into Year 11
- Accessibility to online subject content for all learning areas
- Christian Life Skills offered on elective rotations for student choice in Years 10 to 12
- Cognitive Verb work is ongoing throughout the senior years
- A range of subject specific tutoring and workshop opportunities for students
- In the second semester of Year 11, leadership focus for all students, including a leadership camp.
- In Year 11, Term 4 most General subjects commence Unit 3 (Year 12 work). A study line is optional, for those some who meet the prerequisites
- In Year 12, sessions on University preparation and QTAC applications are provided
- Targeted sessions in career guidance is offered to Year 12 students
- VET offerings include:
 - o Certificate Courses
 - o Traineeship
 - o Apprenticeship
 - Work Experience
 - University Headstart Programs



A developing and enriching co-curricular program operates throughout the College during class times, lunchtimes, and outside school hours. Students are given opportunities to extend skills and venture into areas of interest. In addition, Parklands sends teams to both District and Christian Schools sporting events.

In the Primary / Middle School, the co-curricular program offers activities such as Choirs, Private Instrumental Music Tuition, School Musical, a wide variety of competitive sporting opportunities and Twilight Music presentations.

Outreach:

This generation is eager to engage with and address these critical issues that affect not only our lives but also the lives of the less fortunate.



At Parklands, we strive to help our students understand the complexities of the world they live in and empower them to become history-makers who actively combat injustice and inequality. We look to Jesus as the ultimate example of servant-hearted leadership, who healed the sick, cared for widows, comforted the poor, and spread a message of hope. Student Welfare:

The mission of Parkland's Student Welfare Program is to promote well-being and to develop social competencies. To achieve this aim, we have a multi-facet approach. Our students are intentionally taught various social and emotional skills through our Life Skills curriculum. In addition to classroom learning, our students develop these important skills through various activities such as leadership camps, specific training days with student counsellors and peer support.

School Culture:

Each student is a precious gift from God and is valued as an individual of worth with God-given abilities. The College has been careful to remain small enough to care for students while growing to a sufficient size to provide the facilities and programs that families require. Division of the College into Junior, Middle and Senior Schools enables the staff to be attentive to each child's needs.
